Annual Stockholder Meeting

CTC's annual stockholder meeting was held on July 13th at the Island Hall. President Susan Stranahan and general manager Carol Sabasteanski presented the Treasurer's Report, President's Report, and General Manager's Report. 2012 was a strong year for CTC, with revenue exceeding \$1 million for the first time—a result of increased ridership, barging business, and two multi-day charters for the Navy. The company put the extra funds to good use - purchasing a third bus, improving the Blanchard parking lot, and retiring the loan on the Pied Piper. The balance on the Piper was \$99,665 in January 2012 and \$0 in November 2012! CTC is currently debt free.

Susan Stranahan and Lew Holman were re-elected to the board of directors for three year terms. John Wilson was also elected for a three year term, replacing retiring board member Cap Leonard. John moved to Chebeague Island twelve years ago. He has a B.S. in Forest Management from the University of Vermont and a Ph.D. in Agricultural and Resource Economics from the University of Massachusetts. His corporate experience includes economic modeling and forecasting, timber investment analysis, insurance product design, mergers and acquisitions, operations management, and finance. He taught at Boston University and the University of Southern Maine. He currently serves on the board of the Chebeague Island Community Association and the town's Board of Adjustment and Appeals. He also chairs the town's Capital Planning and Finance Committee.

CTC to accept credit cards—coming soon!

The CTC Board recently approved a plan to begin accepting credit cards for payment on the ferry and the parking lots. We have received many requests from our customers over the years to add this service. The service will be introduced in the fall. When it is implemented, there will be two pricing schedules-one for cash/check payments and one for card payments. The cash/check pricing will remain the same. Cap Leonard has played a vital role in CTC's success over the years. He has served on the board several times starting in the late 1970s, serving twice as president of the company. Cap recently answered the call again and served another term on the board, retiring last month. Cap was the design consultant and Survevor of Record during the construction of the Islander. He says it was a great thrill to deliver Islander to the Chebeague with Lindy Smith and to do the very first docking of her at the Stone Pier. Cap is the grandson of Emily Hamilton Leonard and George Leonard. They and their son Cliff (Cap's dad) operated Leonard's Market on the island from before WWI to 1961. Cap spent most of his career as a marine surveyor and founded the Associated Maine Surveyor organization in 1976. He is presently the senior practicing marine surveyor certified by the National Association of Marine Surveyors.
